ONLINE | Parents' backgrounds, education on My School Website fuels funding fears

INDEPENDENT schools are becoming increasingly concerned financial data on the controversial My School 2.0 website will be used in a government review of public and private school funding.

Association of Independent Schools of South Australia executive director Garry Le Duff said schools were aware of comments made by politicians that financial data might be used for the next funding period which starts in 2014.

The revamped My School 2.0, controlled by the Australian Curriculum, Assessment and Reporting Authority, will

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for the first time have details of a school's financial data and details of the education and occupations of its parent community.

The website, which goes live this Friday, will also allow the community to compare the progress of students in similar schools using data from the 2008-10 literacy and numeracy results.

"The schools are very sensitive that there's a school funding review going on and certainly some politicians are making reference to the fact the data on the website will inform the funding debate," Mr Le Duff said.

"Schools don't have confidence in ACARA's communication that says this data is valid and accurate... their perception is that there have been lots of problems with the data.

"But ACARA had given assurance... it's not being used as part of a funding formula."

He said feedback from schools showed they were

also concerned the new formula used to calculate the Index of Community Socio-Educational Advantage was not communicated properly to parents.

The ICSEA this year was calculated using information provided by parents when enrolling their students or during national literacy and numeracy tests - rather than Australian Census data.

"I would doubt that the majority of parents knew that their education and occupation background would be used (to calculate the ICSEA)," he said.

An ACARA spokesman

said it had communicated and worked "extensively" with independent schools to "collect and verify" data as well as details of the occupation and education of a school's parent community.

"This information is used for a number of purposes, including ACARA's development of ICSEA values, which are used to provide a fair and meaningful way to compare the performance of schools that serve students from similar backgrounds," he said.

"This information has been used to calculate ICSEA values for schools that are more precise than those that

rely on Australian Census data alone."

SA Association of State School Organisations director David Knuckey said My School 2.0 would help parents track their child's progress and monitor funding in schools.

"Knowing how school funds are spent will empower parents and generate an accountability which has been lacking in our public education system," he said.

Schools Minister Peter Garrett said he wanted the site to include schools' assets such as term deposits and physical assets in the future.
