SAASSO Parent Survey

In November of 2012, SAASSO conducted a sample phone survey of parents on Governing Councils.

The survey was conducted in response to complaints from parents about the lack of genuine consultation and communication with parents, by the State Government. After the last state election, the Labor Government pledged to improve its consultation with the South Australian community.

The survey was conducted by volunteers on SAASSO's State Council - parents calling parents.

Parents were asked a short series of yes / no questions and at the end were offered the opportunity to make a comment.

The survey was conducted from November 12 until November 19, 2012.

Office Bearers (chairpersons and treasurers) from the Governing Councils of 132 public schools were polled.

Results

Question: In August of 2012, the State Government released 'Discussion Paper 5' for consultation. This paper covered proposed new child development legislation. Parents were asked if they had seen the discussion paper:

Yes:	17%
No:	83%

Question: Parents were asked if their Governing Council had discussed or provided feedback on the discussion paper:

Yes:	10.11%
No:	86.52%
Unknown:	3.37%

Question: Parents were asked if in their opinion, the State Government listens to parent concerns about education:

Yes:	23.33%
No:	76.67%

Question: Parents were advised that the State Government had announced an investigation into the events surrounding news of a paedophile working in an Adelaide school OSHC, being kept from parents. Respondents were asked if they were confident that the investigation would bring results that would lead to improvements:

Yes:	40.45%
No:	59.55%

Question: Parents were asked if the Education Minister had handled the OSHC paedophile situation appropriately:

Yes:	15.73%
No:	84.27%

Question: Parents were advised that the Education Minister had announced that DECD and SAPOL would be reviewing the policy dealing with when parents should be informed about occurrences such as the OSHC paedophile incident. Parents were asked whether parents should be involved in setting such policies:

Yes:	95.65%
No:	4.35%
